TALKING IN TURN

Parliamentary law. when properly understood by all concerned, can make a meeting more efficient, stimulating, interesting, and short. To quote from a little handbook borrowed from The Chair, at a public meeting "without a common understanding of procedure to be followed, there is likely to be confusion and ill-will." The four basic principles of parliamentary law are "justice and courtesy to all; one thing!

at a time; the rule of the majority; and the rights of the minority."

The order of business at a meeting is 1. the reading, and corrections, or approval of the minutes of the last meeting, 2. reports of committees, 3. unfinished business, 4. new business, 5. adjournment.

To introduce a motion or speak on a question, a member first OBTAINS THE FLOOR. A motion must be made before a question can be discussed. the discussion must be GERMANE. Voting is obtained either by an announcement of THE CHAIR with general consent, or by a member's calling for the PREVIOUS QUESTION. which must be seconded and passed by a 2/3 vote. CHAIR then calls for a vote by raised hands. (Please turn to page 2)
