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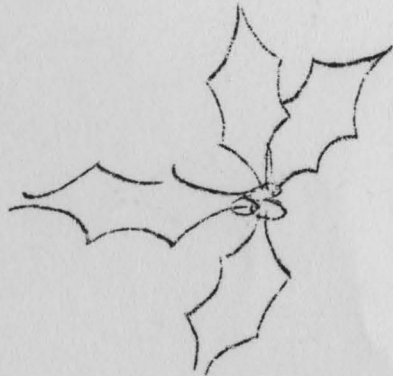

car ahead with her front fender. Miss Calbick stated that if she had it to do over, she would follow the same course of action.

The driver of the first car gave no explanation of why she stopped. Nobody was hurt in that car. When Miss Calbick returned to her car, she noticed that the windshield was broken.

Miss Heimbach had apparently been thrown into it, by the impact of the abrupt stop. Miss Heimbach also mentioned that she had hurt her leg.

An ambulance arrived from Beloit, thirteen miles away, fifteen minutes after, summoned by the police. One hour and fifteen minutes after the accident, Miss Heimbach arrived at the hospital. During this time she showed great courage.

The account of the accident which appeared in the Milwaukee Journal was wrong in stating that Miss Heimbach and Miss Calbick were involved in a five car collision. This error probably arose from the fact that two other cars had collided half a block away in the other lane of traffic.

The eight Iron Curtain countries met at the Kremlin to sign a defense pact to counteract the western defense measure. They will take special measures to safeguard western frontiers. This defense set up will be based on a NATO structure and on previous treaties between these countries.

Sec. of Defense, Charles Wilson has announced that the administration will ask Congress to extend draft laws for four more years and to pass a law for a modified form of U.M.T. He also wishes to increase the standing army by raising army salaries on a selective basis rather than offering an across the board pay rate.

China. Its requests have so far been ignored. The United Nations steering committee has however, recommended that the UN Assembly take action on the matter in special session. This recommendation was passed, 10 to 2, with Russia and Czechoslovakia voting "no", and Burma and Syria abstaining.
