## DELEGATES TO KNOWLEDGE (OR EXPERIENCE)?

The Wisconsin Student Association of the University of Wisconsin is again planning its Ninth Student United Nations Conference, to be held at the University of Wisconsin in Madison, on March 25, 26, 27, 1955.

These conferences are perpetuated because it is the firm belief of the Wisconsin Student Association that world affairs are of tremendous importance to the American university student in these uncertain days.

This conference is held in mock U. N. fashion having a general assembly, Security Council, Trusteeship Council, Human Rights Commission, and Technical Assistance Commission.

Diane Heinz, Mary Anne Treutel, and Yvonne Fogg are looking forward to a stimulating experience as Delegates to the conference from Milwaukee-Downer College. These Delegates will represent Cuba both in the General Assembly and on the Human Rights Commission.

Thursday, March 24, Mr. Johnson will begin his 5 p.m. class in "Critical Thinking." The general outline of the course is as follows:

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# TRAVEL TIME

The decisions of the Travel Time Committee in regard to Spring Vacation have caused much complaint within the student body. Since the students feel that they have no right to complain without being constructive, a proposal has been made and circulated for signatures. The number of signatures obtained shows that the dormitory students are solidly behind it. (It has not been circulated among the city students)

The proposal includes the following provisions:

Inasmuch as the 31 girls who applied for travel time were not treated as individual

cases but rather placed under a general rule, and Inasmuch as the decisions of the Travel Time Committee do not allow the student to use her own discretion in regard to class attendance, and Inasmuch as the student body has expressed great dissatisfaction with the manner in which the Travel Time Committee adopted and enforced this rule without previous knowledge of the students: Therefore be it resolved that: 1) Spring vacation begin at 11:50AM April 1, 1955. 2) That a committee be appointed to study the travel time rules concerning all future vacations, with a view toward revision of the existing rules and student representation on the committee.

The main bone of contention seems to be that the decisions of the Travel Time Committee were made under a hitherto unenforced rule. What this rule is has not been revealed to the students.

The new Travel Time Committee proposed by this petition would be composed of members of the faculty and administration and the student body. The student representatives, it has been stressed, need not have a vote; they should be on the committee to give the student's point of view to

the committee and explain the committee's views to the students. They would also be able to help the students fill out their travel time requests for future vacations. The committee would study the existing written and unwritten rules for travel time and codify them.

It is also suggested that in the future requests be treated as individual cases, not as a group to be approved or disapproved under one rule; and that some revision of the present penalty for cutting classes on the last day be considered.

Two of the reasons for this much protest are that: first, we are supposed to be working toward a student government, and this aim is being thwarted by such unwritten rules as followed by the Travel Time Committee; second, that Spring Vacation is the only time the students are really able to travel anywhere but to their homes. Thanksgiving and midsemesters are too short while Christmas is a family type holiday and most of the students work during the summer.

It is hoped that some reform will result from the proposal. Since it would be too late to affect this year's Spring Vacation, the 11:50 AM closing of school is suggested.
