L.W.A. Council Plans to Amend Constitution

Coeds to Take Action After Convocation on Proposed Amendments

L.W.A. council members present to Lawrence co-eds the following revisions to the L.W.A. constitution and by-laws which must be voted upon after convocation next Monday:

To strike out the clauses reading:

(1) "The purpose of the association shall be to foster religious activities on the campus and to maintain the upkeep of the woman's lounge in Main hall." It is no longer necessary for the L.W.A. to sponsor these activities as they have been taken over by the convocation and social committees of the executive committee.

Duties of Council

(2) One of the duties of the council shall be "to maintain the relation of the L.W.A. to the central association of Y.W.C.A." As Appleton or Lawrence has no Y.W.C.A., there is no need for this clause.

(3) "When there are more than two nominations for any office, a primary election shall be held. The two candidates carrying the highest number of votes shall be named on the final ticket, and this election shall be held at least three days before the final election." Seldom are there more than two nominations made from the floor in addition to the two nominated by the L.W.A. council. When such nominations were received from the floor formerly, it was necessary to hold two elections in succeeding convocations.

Then, to abolish the articles concerning:

Lounge Group

(1) The Women's Lounge committee. The duties of this group have now been taken over by subcommittees of the executive committee.

(2) The Geneva committee and the election of a Geneva committee chairman. This group was disbanded in 1939.

To amend the section reading that the election of council members shall be held within the first two weeks of the second semester, by crossing out the words "within the first two weeks of second semester" and substituting "before February 22."

Radio Course for Girls Begins Soon

Final plans for the course in radio for girls are now in order, and classes are to start Wednesday, February 17 from 7 to 10 in room 27 of Main hall, Bob Barton is to be the student instructor.

So far 37 girls have signed up for the course. Equipment will be furnished by the physics department, and the school is going to supply official army signal code practice instruction equipment. Also in order to facilitate code practice, code practice oscillators are going to be set up in Sage and Ormsby.

Red Cross Asks for Donors of Blood When Unit Visits Appleton

Any student willing to donate a pint of blood to the Red Cross blood Bank can make appointments at the Dean's office now. The Bank will be in Appleton March 1, 2 and 3.

All donors must weigh over 110 pounds and be in good health. Those who are under 21 must have the written consent of his parent or guardian specifically permitting the student "to give one pint of blood to the Red Cross Blood Bank." Donors are not to eat during the four hours preceding their appointment.

S. I. Hayakawa To Speak Here

Students Have Chance To Hear Famous Author Of Freshman Textbook

S. I. Hayakawa, famous author will speak to Lawrence students in chapel Thursday, February 18. He is already well-known to the freshmen and sophomores for his book *Language in Action*. This book which was selected by the Book of the Month club has not only been used widely as a textbook but has had a very wide popular sale.

Mr. Hayakawa himself is a Canadian citizen born of Japanese parents. However, most of his work has been done in this country, and in this state. He received his Ph.D. from the University of Wisconsin, and taught there for several years. At present he is on the staff of the Illinois Institute of Technology. As part of his work he is giving a series of lectures at the Lawrence Institute of Paper Chemistry on semantics in science.

Semantics deals with the relation of words to their meanings and his talk will be on *The Art of Naming*. His work is in the field of general semantics where he is known as one of the most important followers of Count Korzybski who is known as the founder of this particular type of semantics.

Increase Number of Pictures In Art Rental Collection

During the course of the semester Lawrence college has been purchasing color reproductions and original silk screen paintings in full color to be added to the Art Rental collection. As a means of introducing the new acquisitions to the student body and the townspeople, a special exhibition was held in the library from January 14 to February 1.

Opponents Boast of Strong Outfit for Big Game Tomorrow

Carleton's powerful cagers come to the Vikes stronghold tomorrow night in what should be the best game of the year. The Carls, always strong on the hard court, have whipped together a potent team that is definitely big time.

Last Monday night they chalked up their tenth win of the year by drubbing North Dakota State. The Carls have lost to Minnesota by five points, Marquette by four points and just lost out to the U. of Iowa 46-43 in the last few seconds of play. They have beaten several Midwest teams among them Cornell by a 44-34 score.

The Vikes beat the Carls 38-36 in 1940 and last year at Northfield, the home of the Carls, the Vikes were edged out 35-34. The game tomorrow night has every indication of being as close as those two recent meetings between the two schools.

Carleton's starting line-up will probably have Captain Bill Howard and big Jack Verby at the forward posts, football end Jack Marvin at center and Ken Johnson and Wally Ulrick at the guards. Against this combination Coach Ray Hamann will pit his usual starting five of Miller and Crossett at forwards, Buesing at center, and Harvey and Morris at guard. Coach Hamann feels that the Vikes will have to play every bit as good as they did during the second half of the Camp Grant game if they expect to win. At any rate it will be a good game. The Carls rate the Vikes as one of their toughest opponents and will be gunning for this one.

A dismal start which saw the Vikes behind 14-3 at one time threw away any chance the Vikes had to beat the powerful Camp Grant Warriors here Wednesday night, the final score being 47-42. Dick Miller led all players by pouring 22 points through the net to keep up his sensational shooting of recent games. Dick has hit the basket for 72 points in the last three games all against top-notch opponents.

Don Blanken and Mickey Rottner, former Purdue and Loyola all-American, led the soldiers with 12 and 11 points, respectively.

Soldiers Poised
The soldiers' poise stood them in good stead and in six minutes had a comfortable 14 to 3 lead before Miller scored the first Vike goal from the floor. Rottner and Blanken kept the soldiers in the game and after a rather dull first half the soldier's lead had been cut to 21-16.

Buesing's two free throws were the best the Vikes could do as Camp Grant ran their lead to 11 points on baskets by Herb Brechtmeier, Blanken and Rottner. The Vikes, scrapping like mad, got into the game again and baskets by Miller, Crossett, Buesing, and Morris cut the soldiers' lead to three points, six minutes before the gun. Vikes Beat Coe, Cornell

Miller Leads Scoring In Both Games; Scores Total of 50 Points

Led by sharpshooting Dick Miller who scored 50 points in the two games, the Vike Cagers roared to win over Cornell and Coe by scores of 51-45 and 53-50 on the crucial Iowa trip last weekend. According to reports received from Iowa, Dick's shooting the second half of the Coe game was nothing short of sensational. He hit for 20 points in the second period, and it took the whole Coe team to keep up with him.

Captain Bill Crossett hit his seasons high at Coe by banging 15 points through the nets. Bill also slammed 8 points through at Cornell. Warren Buesing scored 18 points at the two games, and his excellent rebound work featured the twin wins.

The two games vaulted the Vikes into a secure hold on first place in the conference. Monmouth has lost one already, and if the Vikes can get by Ripon down there February 24, or if Monmouth loses another game, the Vikes will have the title. The victories on the Iowa trip marked the ninth straight Midwest conference win since September when the grid-ders drubbed five conference opponents.

Lawrence played some of its best ball of the season in spots during the second half, but the experience of the Camp Grant team proved too much. The Warriors have lost only to Wisconsin by two points earlier in the season but have numbered among their 26 victories this season the sensational Illinois team. So the Vikes have no cause to hang their heads over this defeat. It would have been nice to have beaten those big-timers, but it just wasn't in the books.

The Vike splashers this Saturday will be out to avenge a twin beating at the hands of Milwaukee State Teachers' college last year and the way the team has been shaping up it looks like they might do it.

Big Louie Traas who just became eligible looks like a cinch to win his specialty, the 100 yard breast stroke. Louie's time of 1:10 seconds is 4 seconds better than the winning time at the conference meet last year and big things are expected of him this year. Coach and Captain Ev Turley is still unbeaten in his number one event, the 100 yard back stroke, and in a telegraphic meet against Carleton last Tuesday, he broke his own pool record by almost a full second.
